"It's Friday, but Sunday's a'comin'"

I suppose most preachers have used that phrase from the famous message at some time or another.

At this time of year, in the normal rhythm of the church, we would be preparing our people to walk with Jesus from Palm Sunday through Easter. Most of us will try to imagine the glory of Palm Sunday, the aroma of the oil poured on the feet of Jesus, the smell of the Passover lamb, the treachery of Judas, religious leaders, and the fickle crowd. We can hear the cock crow in the distance and the sound of the lash on the back of Jesus. We can hear the ringing of the cold hammer on the hot nails as the pierce the hands and feet of Jesus and we try to comprehend the agony of the cross. All the while, we remember, "It's Friday, but Sunday's a'comin'."

With the danger, death, and restrictions caused by COVID-19, we may more than ever feel the desolation and isolation of *that* Friday. We are cowering in fear as the disciples did following the betrayal of Jesus. We are wondering what the morning will bring, like the bleak Saturday evening group of Jesus-followers. We are wondering if it will ever be the same again.

I have some great news for you. It may feel like it's Friday, but Sunday is definitely a'comin.

I have been so proud and amazed at the ways in which our churches have been responding to this crisis. COVID has come, but the church keeps breaking through in many ways. From services broadcast on social media, to food distribution, daycares, mask-makers, shoppers, caregivers, and parents who are finding creative ways to care for their children who cannot fully understand what is going on, the Church continues to be the church. We continue to be light in the darkness and continue to be the church with the dawning of every new day.

It may feel like Friday, but this season of trial and grief will pass. When it is over, we will have learned some new skills, made deeper connections with each other, and will have found ways to break through the darkness. In the same way that Easter proclaims that the Word became flesh and the darkness had never overcome it, this season will proclaim that the Word continues to put on flesh in the form of people called Christians. **The darkness can not overcome it.**

Links Gift Guidelines from Global Missions

Beginning January 1, 2020, the following guidelines were put into effect for Links gifts:

- A church or district may only give a monetary gift categorized as Links to missionaries who are assigned to them through Links.
- Links monetary gifts that are less than US \$200 will continue to be given to the missionary through the payroll system and counted as a personal gift.
- Links monetary gifts of US \$200 or more will be placed into the missionary's deputation account. Any Links monetary gift received from a church or district for a missionary not assigned to them through Links will be placed into the intended missionaries deputation account. Gifts for retirees who are not assigned to the district as Links will be delayed.

Nate has served as a full time Youth Pastor for 8 years in North Little Rock, Arkansas, Vallejo, CA and Hemet, California in the Church of the Nazarene. While in Vallejo and Hemet, Nate attended Pacific Rim School of Theology in South San Francisco, CA.

He was ordained in 2005 on the South Arkansas District. He has served as Lead Pastor for the last 15 years in Benton, Arkansas, Longview, Texas, Lake Jackson, Texas, and now Roswell, New Mexico.

Nate has a big heart for his community. Outside of his church duties, he has served as a Chaplain the North Little Arkansas PD, Vallejo, CA PD, Benton, AR PD, Saline County Arkansas Sheriff's Dept, and West Columbia, Texas, PD. We need your help. MISSION ALBUQUERQUE

I had a chance to talk to Pastor Pete regarding his needs for MISSION ABQ at Sandia Church of the Nazarene. They are continuing to distribute much needed food in their area. I asked him what we could do to come along side him with help. Here are his thoughts and ideas!

"We always need food donations and money. Thursdays, we partner with another organization, but right now several of their donors (who are older) are not able to bring hot food, so we've been picking up the slack. We do have people that throw in to help, but if you know of people that might help, we would love it.

We've actually been distributing more meals at most of our meal times than usual because others have scaled back.

Canned food is great for food bank distribution... cans that can be eaten cold and opened with a tab, like beans/vienna sausages, etc. are great for the homeless. Non-perishables like fruit cups, applesauce pouches, etc. make good meal items that can be eaten now or saved for later...

With skeleton crews for the hot meal distributions, some kind of box mixes that are easily thrown together in a crockpot are helpful...then we hand them out into little to-go cups."

URGENT PRAYER REQUEST FROM OUR SOUTHWEST NATIVE AMERICAN DISTRICT!

Sending you a urgent prayer request. By now you might have heard about the c-virus infecting our churches in northern Arizona. On March 7th our northern zone churches met for annual zone rally at Chilchenbeto Nazarene church, we had a packed house as we worshiped and encouraged one another, little did we know, the virus would affect our people there. Four of our pastors are in the hospital now, 2 are on respirators. It effected several others, some are in hospitals, mainly elderly and those with prior medical conditions. We have chosen to quarantine ourselves and treating symptoms, fever and cough.. we went to the clinic last Friday to see if we can get tested for the virus. They said our vitals were good compared to worst cases. Anyway, we have been home since, so just reaching out to our Nazarene family for special prayers. Our hope is in the Lord Almighty!! we keep encouraging our people that God is still in control!! to keep the faith and trusting.
